Vicars Write:

Dear Parishioners

In my 8 3/4 years as vicar, I have used this column to convey how St Denys' congregation can help serve the parish through our various ministries and resources. On only one previous occasion have I use this column to ask for help and today, I regretfully need to do so again.

Like every other charity and church in the land, the church's finance has been severely hit by the pandemic, leaving us with a projected deficit by the **end of 2021 of £23,760!**

This is because of a drop in public services where cash collections are possible (the vast majority of our congregation give by standing order/online), not being able to hold our main fundraiser, the Village Festival, and a Covid-related drop-in Fees received for taking Weddings and Funerals. Included shortfall is £6,000 worth of urgent building work for St Denys and St George's, Hatford which we must do within the next 12 months. Goosey Chapel needs an additional £20,000 urgently spent on it - but we've not included that in the

figure above as we'll have to go to Trust funds separately for such an amount.

The church congregation here is currently reviewing its giving in light of the Covid impact and are taking part in a **Gift Day on November 7**, and we've applied to a local Trust for a £4,000 emergency grant. But this will still leave us with a substantial shortfall.

The church's reserves are around £13,000 of useable funds- but that would leave us with zero in the bank. We do have around £13,000 on 'special reserve' as an Emergency Fund in the event of a major building project needing doing to enable the church to remain open but are obviously reluctant to wipe that fund dry as well. So, the pandemic has left us facing a financial challenge!

Contrary to popular belief, the church does NOT receive any funding from the Government or the CofE either nationally or the diocese. Both of those later sources are charities in themselves. Finance to build and reorder St Denys over the centuries have always come from the current congregation, and villagers. Our current congregation is around 40 faithful folk. They serve the village in so many practical and pastoral ways - and - they have been funding all the costs of maintaining St Denys to be there for use by the village whenever needed: baptisms, weddings, funerals, Remembrance Sunday, Christmas, School events, village events etc.

And so, because I know that for so many people in the village, St Denys is 'my church' or 'our village church', the PCC has asked that I use this column to ask for your help.

Given the unprecedented effect of a pandemic on our church's finance, we would like all those who wish to see St Denys remain there for whenever villagers need it, to consider making a one-off donation.

This can be done in a number of ways:

A) a cheque, payable to Stanford PCC (St Denys), or cash, can be put in an envelope (with name and address for receipt please), and put through the Vicarage letterbox at 24 Church Green

B) you can make a BACS transfer by sending a gift to our church a/c at: Lloyds Bank, Sort Code 30-93-18, and account no 00109758. Please add '2021 Gift' in the Reference option. If you do this and would like a receipt, please drop a note through my letterbox, or email me vicar@stdenys.org

C) we have created an online giving page on our church website as well. This can be found at <u>www.stdenys.org</u> If you are a taxpayer and make a donation by either of these methods, please email me so I can send you a Gift Aid form to complete. It will boost your gift by 25%!

I am sorry that I need to write in this way, but from meeting dozens of families over the years, I know the

place that St Denys plays in so many family's histories over years, decades and in some families, centuries. I therefore felt that many would like the opportunity to give a gift, whether £10 or whatever folk can afford, to ensure that we break even this year and move into 2022 on a strong financial footing. This will enable us to continue to serve the village for many more decades and centuries to follow.

Foundation - We have been playing in our role play kitchen with the three bears. We are learning our numbers with the help of Numberblocks. Over the last few weeks, we have gone to Forest School. We have enjoyed collecting leaves and berries, playing in the tree fort and on the pirate ship. We enjoyed creating an Autumnal leaf ring from the leaves we collected.

Year One - In Maths we have been busy adding and creating maths sentences. We used clay to construct Inukshuk sculptures. In PE we are developing our throwing skills by throwing balls to our partners. Our story about the 'Lost Penguin' has inspired us to write our own lost animal stories.

Year Two - We are really enjoying learning about the Great Fire of London. In PE we have been learning to shoot into a hoop, while in Music we have been learning some new songs. We are working on learning our 3 times tables - which are a bit tricky! It is great to have Sweet Shack up and running again.

Year Three - We have been learning lots of facts

about the Rainforest. Where the rainforests are and the different parts of the rainforest. We are about to send off our letters to the Prime Minister where we have discussed the effect of deforestation and climate change and the need to do something. In Music we have been singing 'Three Little Birds' by Bob Marley and have started to add musical accompaniment through our recorder playing. Year Four - In hockey we have been learning to tackle and pass gently, while ensuring we keep our hockey sticks down. We have been busy writing our own versions of Alice in Wonderland, changing either the characters or setting and what the character does. We have enjoyed using maps and map references to find places in Geography. Year Five - We were visited by an explorer named Doc Worrall from 'Portals to the Past'. We had a great time dressing up, hunting on the River Nile, learning the (literal) ins and outs of the mummification process, solving mathematical problems with hieroglyphs and much more. In Art we got to create our own Egyptian Cats from clay. Year Six - We visited Coleshill for a WWII experience. The volunteers at Coleshill taught us lots of new facts and skills. We went underground, followed maps, deciphered codes, found dead drop messages, looked at artefacts, uncovered the traitor and much more. In English we have been writing positive and negative arguments for whether to accept an evacuee.

On Friday 24th September we held our Harvest Service at St Denys Church. We presented food goods and then said thank you for all the food we have and all the people who grow and prepare our food.
