Dear Parishioners

A villager said to me this week that they felt they were constantly living in a departure lounge, ready for their longed-for destination, but that the plane's departure was always being delayed, or, they were 'called', and just about to embark, only for the flight to be cancelled!

It is as if we are almost 'back to normal' but not 100% and of course, were holding our breath over the effect of this winter on the NHS.

It can all feel a bit gloomy at times, but it reminds me very much how the Jewish people felt having been back from the final exile, back in Jerusalem, and awaiting the Messiah. Yet it was generation after generation of waiting before the Messiah came.

The world 2,000 years ago was an oppressive one. One without hope. One without opportunity - unless you did everything the Roman Empire demanded.

God's people – the Jews – had been holding out for so long for their long-awaited Messiah, the one who would bring light into their darkness. Who would create a 'new world order' before their eyes. And one who would bring salvation and peace and hope.

Of course, when Jesus came, tragically, the Jewish people, by and large did not receive Him – they still don't as Messiah. And yet, they perhaps didn't receive Him as their perceptions of the Messiah was one of strength and power and might. A new General to demolish by human power the oppression of the Romans?

Instead, Jesus came as a baby, into an average family and his 'new world order' was not to be achieved by might, but through love and forgiveness and a new direction from within.

Stanford in the Vale Community First Responders

Over the last few years, Stanford's Community First Responders (Jeanette Gill and Les Harding) have studied for and now been awarded a nationally recognised qualification in ambulance service first responding. Topics covered include assessment of casualties, basic airway management; basic life support and external defibrillation; management of medical conditions and injuries; and the emergency care of wounds, bleeding, and trauma.

They have also completed the National Volunteer Certificate from NHS Health Education England. To qualify for this award, they were required to complete online training modules and complete 60 hours of voluntary work. Jeanette and Les have each committed thousands of hours on call during their time as CFRs – a combined total of over 20 years.

The South Central Ambulance Charity (Registered Charity no 1049778) exists to raise funds to support the work CFRs do by providing money for services, projects and equipment that is not supplied by Government NHS funding. These items were then taken to Masons Wool shop in Abingdon, where they were put on sale in aid of Cancer Research. I am sure that Betty would have been pleased to think that her hard work had not been wasted and that she had helped a good cause.
