#### The Vicar Writes

AS I started to write this piece, a news alert came up on my IPhone which read: "Bethlehem officially cancels Christmas for the first time in decades over Israel-Hamas war". A far cry from the Christmas carol which says "O Little town of Bethlehem how still we see thee lie".

Not for the first time, on first view, the picture painted in carols is drastically different to reality today.

But as ever, we need to look beyond the headlines, for the carol goes on to say "Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting Light; The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight."

Around 2023 years ago, a young couple, Mary and Jo were going back to Jo's hometown to re-register for the Census, so the invading Romans could ensure the full taxes were paid to stockpile their military might and power. Nothing new about invasions of Israel it seems.

Many carols take two words "The Inn", and that there was "no room" there, and do an amazing Hollywood job and create all sorts of stories, characters and scenes so that all of a sudden, a husband, Jo, who was of the Royal line from King David, and his young wife, Mary, carrying the next generation of Kingly line (so the carols say), are shunted off to a 'stable' (nowhere in the Bible does it say that), and Mary gives birth, on her own, in an unheated, unlit, cow-dunged stable or barn? Really?

The actual word 'Inn' is properly translated to mean the "Upper Room" in a typical house of the day in which the whole family normally slept downstairs, together, in the main living room. There was one room upstairs, often a room open to the stars (due to the heat and good weather), where family visitors would stay – called the "inn".

So, with dozens of people returning home to Bethlehem at that time, (experts believe the normal population of Bethlehem in AD30 was around 600 people), it's pretty likely that the 'Inn' of many family homes would already be occupied with sons and daughters and their families dropping in for a night or two.

So where was Jesus born? Well, the reference to the 'manger' gives us a clue.

It was a special hole/troth in the downstairs living room floor, where food and water for cattle was contained. And in the very cold weather, very young cattle, or lambs were brought in for the night. They literally slept in the same space as the family. In fact, in certain parts of Israel and the Middle East today, is still happens, and this family/animal living/sharing concept is very well documented.

So, far from being shunned and turned away, Mary and Jo very probably were welcomed to bed for the night in the family living room. Surrounded by family who'd look after Mary and then, when nature took its course and Jesus was about to be delivered by women helpers, no doubt yes, the men were shunted off to the pub, served by the Inn Keeper who this time, did his proper job, serving them a pint to wet the baby's head!

But what difference does it make? Lots.

For a start, it shows that God himself was delivered in human form into the very beating heart of family life, not a private, top-end midwifery unit, into the living room, surrounded by all sorts of family, with al sorts of personalities and backgrounds and no doubt like any family, there would have been the usual arguments, as well as acts of love.

Mary and Jo were visitors, but there was a proper family welcome, so much so, that the bible explains they stayed in town for quite some time: the wisemen didn't pop in with pretty useless baby toys on Boxing day, but maybe a year or so later, experts believe.

And then, and only then, did they leave Bethlehem because the wise men told Jo that the self-imposed ruler at the time was threatened about news of another 'king', and wanted to kill all Jewish children in that small community: history repeats itself, sadly.

Now, a bit like today, in Israel there were different views on how to overthrow those who sought to annihilate the Jews from their land, or claim their right to the land. Most wanted a new King, a Messiah, to develop a Resistance Army and fight against the Romans. Through might and aggression, demonstrate who was really in charge and throw them out of Israel. Others were not so sure given the history of fighting in the land.

God's solution? To send into the midst of power struggles, violence, and corruption in Government a selfless baby who lived a normal family life amongst a carpenter dad and siblings, then when around 30, spent three years teaching peace, love and justice. So much so, the rulers even then found this man a threat. They colluded with others, used fake news and false evidence to try him, sentence him to death and then crucify him. All seemed pretty bleak and impossible: the plan which God offered – peace with God and with others, and a new Kingdom not of this world, defeated. It seemed, the powerful military might, those with the most ammunition, the Romans, had won

But how does that hymn end?

"How silently, how silently, the wondrous Gift is giv'n;

So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of His Heav'n.

No ear may hear His coming, but in this world of sin, Where meek souls will receive Him still, the dear Christ enters in."

Even today, in the darkest, most desperate parts of the world, from the innocent civilians in Gaza, or Israel, or in Ukraine, or those who this Christmas sit alone at night when the children are in bed as this year, their marriage has broken up. Even today, to those who this Christmas grieve the loss of a loved one, taken from them too soon.

Even then, to the person who watches the fun and joy around them, the bright lights, and hears the music blaring around the shops, and on the radio and yet, and yet, they are walking in a parallel world, awaiting that letter from the hospital with a test appointment, or for the follow up meeting to hear the news they really hope is not what they dread. Even today, the dear Christ wants to enter in.

Just over 2,000 years ago, one night a rather seemingly odd and irrelevant act of God occurred: His son being born on earth. But in sending Jesus into one of the darkest times of Israel's history then, and right into the very heart of family life in that downstairs living room, a place of fun and lighter, and rows and pain, sometimes verbal, even occasionally physical, was born Jesus. Jesus, who brought light and life and love, and for two millennia, has changed the lives of all who will invite him into their lives – and transform their darkness because God is within them, "Emmanuel", whatever they face.

The last verse of that carol says:

"O holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us, we pray; Cast out our sin, and enter in, be born in us today. We hear the Christmas angels the great glad tidings tell:

Oh, come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel!" May you welcome Emmanuel into your family living room, and into your life, whether dark, or light, crowded or alone, this Christmas.
