The Vicar Writes - February

OVER the past four months or so, I have been increasing concerned at what I can only describe as a 'Spirit of Division' brewing up in society.

There is no doubt that the pressure of 11 months of living under a pandemic, lack of sleep, lack of balance, frustrations etc. can boil over. Criticisms start first, then personal attacks, and when fully brewed, into outright attack and violence as we saw in Washington DC last month, and a variety of demonstrations, mostly peaceful – others not so, last year.

I've noticed how Facebook groups, even comprised of mature folk, have been tetchier, and people increasingly defensive and argumentative. This latest lockdown, coming as it has in the winter, has taken its toll even on those for whom 2020 was manageable.

I believe this spirit of division in society is something we need to watch, carefully, to pray against, to be peacemakers and reconcilers,

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wherever we can and be aware that division is one of Satan's tried and tested methods of distracting nations from pursuing justice and peace.

COVID has exposed, once again, the disparity and inequality in many aspects of our social life, from racial inequality through to children living in inadequate housing, lack of access to IT or, even basic day to day food – hence our foodbanks are at full stretch.

Post COVID, we must pray that our political leaders unite across the divides and really take a fresh look at issues such as housing, education, health and social care, and the widening gap between those who have and those who have not. These cannot continue to be Party Political issues. They need a new united focus. And of course, they are Kingdom issues, and issues of justice and as such, the Church must have a prophetic voice into solutions and play a practical role.

In the meantime, division zaps our energy, diverts our eyes and goals, and can become incredibly time-consuming.

Of late, I have been reading again John Stotts '*The Living Church*' and was reminded how distraction and division are two of Satan's key weapons.

I have recently had to handle a few issues where people could have grown further and further apart if they had not been gently shown that division was like a cancer, and that we must not allow it to spread.

So, let us pray for each other, seeking to restore unity in society and maintain unity in our families.

Colossians 3:13 says: "Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you." Our model of forgiveness is Jesus, who is also the Prince of Peace.

So, as we start another month in lockdown, let us pray that the Lord would help us to be gracious and patient, wise in the way we respond to people, personally or via social media, and let's remember to pray for our national and international leaders who, after 11 months of incredible pressure, need God's strength and wisdom to lead us through this pandemic.

Blessings on you in your own, unique situation as a peacemaker and reconciler.

Stanford in the Vale Pre School

We were lucky enough to have the rotten broken fence in our growing garden replaced and the children have enjoyed spending time out there, getting involved in Forest School activities, bug hunting and filling up our bug hotel with any creatures we found. We look forward to digging and planting over the coming weeks.

3D modelling has been a huge area of interest this term with some amazing creations from cars to kitchen's to princess castles, robots and much more. The children have designed and planned their work and used their fine motor skills with cutting, sticking, and painting their masterpieces and proudly taken them home.

There has been lots of physical activity outside with running games, scooter and trike play as well as jumping from our climbing cubes. We enjoyed a trip to the park's grass area where we made footprints in the frost and looked at the beautiful work of art the spider makes with his web. We learnt about temperature, what we use to measure it and the differences between freezing and warm and numbers.

Our maths interest area has been a huge success and the children have enjoyed using rulers to measure each other and different objects, making patterns with different shapes and using their describing words to look at the differences. We have enjoyed weighing and estimating what would be heavier and what would be lighter.

Reported by the School Council:

What a start to the term! Not the start we had expected but everyone has adapted to the enforced changes really well. We are still open but only to the children of critical workers and vulnerable children which is about 70 - 80 children. We have all risen to the challenge of delivering online, live lessons using Microsoft TEAMS. Staff, parents and children are all doing exceptionally well with this new way of working considering we only had 12 hours notice!

All classes have started learning their new topics:

Foundation: Jurassic Journey

Year 1: Tea, Toast and Tomato Ketchup

Year 2: London's Burning

Year 3: Stone Age - Iron Age

Year 4: Viking invaders and Saxon settlements

Year 5: Aurora and Wonder!

Year 6: The Mysterious Maya

Foundation have learnt about dinosaur skin and colours, painted dinosaurs and been reading dinosaur stories.

Year 1 have been learning their times tables, reading the story 'Handa's Surprise' and working on purple mash on the laptops.

Year 2 are growing beans, helicopter seeds and dandelion seeds. They have been learning how to multiply and all about fire safety - stop, drop, roll!

Year 3 have listened to a stone age story, been dividing amounts in maths and learning food words in French.

Year 4 have been learning a bear wolf story, practising multiplication and division and started learning about Anglo Saxons and Viking.

Year 5 have been learning a Norse myth, been working on short multiplication and in art have created a Snow Queen and 3D lego bricks.

Year 6 have learnt about the artist Frida Kahlo and drawn her head and flowers, in maths they completed a quiz on teams, in science they have been grouping animals and in English learnt a story about the hero twins.
