The Vicar writes

AS this newsletter drops through letterboxes, it is Easter week.

For some, this means a much-needed few extra days break from work, with Spring now bringing lighter nights and what seems to have been a very long, hard winter, behind us.

I know many people look forward to Easter weekend as strategically, it is turning point from the dark winter into a season of lighter days, and possibilities and yes, often hope.

Perhaps ironic, then, that it means to many people (in practical ways) what, to Christians is believed and felt at a much deeper, spiritual level.

Good Friday, of course, represents the death of Jesus and Him descending to the dead - due to the sin that He carried on behalf of all of us. The Bible stories describe the painful sight of those he loved, watching on, as Jesus was nailed to a cross. Having been taken down, his body was put in a secure tomb — and then to be sure, the Roman authorities posted two guards at the entrance.

Easter Saturday, however, is where so many people live their lives today – even if they are glad the winter is over, and summer is approaching. They have turned their backs, metaphorically, on the past, but are waiting for the future hope?

To the followers of Jesus, despite what he told them would happen, having experience his death first hand, at a totally understandably human level, they believed Jesus to dead. Gone, and that was it. Final!

It is perhaps not surprising, then, that the first witnesses to His resurrection were shocked, ran back and told the disciples - who too were unconvinced and had to go and experience the truth for themselves. Even then, for many, until they actually experienced Jesus resurrection, they did not believe. That is also true of many people today: until; they experience Jesus, they cant say 'yes', or I believe'

Over the past year or so, despite the continued downward trend in Church of England attendance, I am delighted that in this parish, **in addition** to our weekly Parish Holy Communion Service at 1015am on Sundays at St Denys, we have experienced real shoots of new life! The once-a-month evening service at 6pm at **All Saints, Goosey** (2nd Sunday) and **St George, Hatford** (4th Sunday) have seen good numbers attending – many for the first time, some returning after years away from church, whilst others used to worship there before Covid. Whatever reason, it is a joy that they are part of our **growing worshipping community** and are welcome. We look forward to continued growth in



those services at Goosey & Hatford in the years to follow.

Our Denys@4, our 4pm, weekly Families (informal) Sunday service, launched on October 9 (St Denys Day) 2022 at St Denys, has now seen around 55 adults and children attending at some time over a five-week period. Given the practicalities of family life, we don't get them all worshipping together at one time, but we are now seeing a regular 25/30, most of whom, before Denys@4, would not have worshipped regularly in church.

Whether people attend at 1015am, 4pm or 6pm, or in whatever church building, each is on a journey from Good Friday, through the questions of Easter Saturday, into the life and purpose of living daily with God - thanks to the work Jesus did on the cross of defeating death and sin, rising for us so that whether we live here on earth, or in the life to come, our daily relationship with God, our Faither will be a continuum. That fact and daily experience brings a security, depth, purpose and meaning to life that many are finding satisfies a deep longing and fills a God-shaped hole in their lives.

So, this Easter time, as you look at the cross that will be displayed throughout the Easter Season in St Denys churchyard, although the cross may be in the churchyard, note one key thing: The Cross is Bare, the Tomb is Empty and the Throne (in Heaven) is now occupied.

May the hope and joys of the promise of summer ahead be accompanied in your life with an increasing awareness that God's love and desire for us all is to walk in faith from Good Friday through to Easter Day. And then, to the Ascension - for in the same way lesus ascended to be with His Father, for those who believe and trust in Him, 'even though they die, yet shall they live' as they will spend eternity with God, and all those who also have committed their lives to Him.

So a very Happy Easter season and Spring!

Church Bell Ringing

Our local area began organising ringing sessions specifically for Young People during the latter part of 2023. These are open to all young ringers in the Vale of the White Horse as well as invitees from neighbouring regions. The ringers, with parents and ringing tutors, meet roughly monthly at a church in the area and enjoy the opportunity to ring together, either on church bells or on a portable mini-ring (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=IKfUwLE3Jeg).

The February event, at Shrivenham, was attended by at least 8 youngsters aged under 18. They were shown the church bells and the church clock as well as tower views across the Vale and they enjoyed drinks and snacks before ringing on the 10 church bells. We will be hosting the April meeting at Stanford in the Vale using church bells and the mini-ring again.

The Vale area also hosts monthly evening practices, open to ringers of all ages, and these also rotate around the district and give opportunity to advance learning as well as to catch up with ringing friends across the Vale.

The Vale ringers additionally organise social events and recently enjoyed a quiz evening at Uffington with the bonus of a fish and chip supper between rounds. A riverside picnic is planned for the summer.

- Increase watering of houseplants
- Feed shrubs and roses


