### **Church Bell Ringing**

#### How did you spend your Sunday afternoon?

I spent some of mine perched on a wooden beam, high up in the church tower – about ¾ of the way up from the ground – trying to persuade a 7" bolt to move out of a large piece of wood. The main

purpose of that piece of wood, called a headstock, is to hold a 3cwt (187kg) bell up. The bolts (2 of them) were holding a smaller piece of wood, called a stay, which is also attached to the headstock. The stay's purpose is to allow the bell to rest upright with the heavy bell "mouth" pointing up.

#### Why, you might ask, was I doing that?

Well, the stay is not only designed to enable the bell stay upright when required, it is also designed to break if too much pressure is applied as, if the stay didn't give way, then other parts of the structure would instead be damaged and, while inconvenient, replacing a stay is much easier and economical than paying thousands of pounds to repair a bell installation. This particular stay had broken, and I was removing the remnant in order to get a precise specification for the replacement.

It's not for everyone, but it is fascinating to see how the tower and how the bell frame are constructed. Sitting next to a bell that is 133 years old (one of the younger bells in our tower, 5 of them are 324 years old), in a part of the tower that was built in the Middle Ages, on a frame that is constructed in a very similar manner to that which would have been used when the bells were first cast, is, some would say, a privilege. It is certainly interesting and

We now have the replacement stay and some nice new shiny bolts and by the time you read this, we should have installed the replacement stay and the bell will be back in use.

If you or anyone you know would be interested in being involved in maintaining the bell installation in the future, please do get in touch. No pre-knowledge is required but you would need to be reasonably fit, be able to ascend ladders and to climb around the structure. Please do get in touch via e-mail (StDenysChurchBells@btinternet.com) or by talking to the vicar, the church wardens or the tower captain. (I should add that the drop from the frame is not the full 3/4 height of the church tower. There are two floors between).

Please do also contact us, via the e-mail address, if you'd like to get involved in ringing the church bells. Full training provided.

Incidentally, I am reliably told that one of the carpenters involved in the construction of the bell frame carved his initials somewhere. I look every time I am working in the bell chamber - but I have vet to find them. There is a lot of wood there! Jackie Tower Captain

### Folk Session at The Horse & Jockey and the William Titchener Connection

Did you know that there are folk songs from our village? In the 1920s and 30s a folklorist from the US called Dr James Madison Carpenter travelled throughout England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland collecting folk songs and tunes. It was 1932 when he got to Stanford and met a singer called William Titchener. Titchener gave him about 6 songs, Carpenter wrote down the words and made recordings onto wax cylinder, and these records are available online.

When some local folk musicians and singers were invited by the Horse & Jockey to set up a regular folk session, it was decided that it was a great opportunity to sing William Titchener's songs again.

The session happens on the 2nd Thursday of the month and the next one will be on 13th December at 8pm. It is an informal evening of traditional folk tunes and songs. Everyone is welcome to play, sing, join in with the choruses and or listen and soak up the atmosphere. Some of the tunes and songs are very local, like Titchener's songs or tunes from villages in the area, some are from further afield.
