The Vicar Writes - January 2025

Dear Parishioners

A very Happy New Year to you!

The turning of the calendar is a natural moment for reflection—on what has been, on what is, and on what is to come. It offers a sacred pause, a chance to consider where we've been as individuals, as a church, as a community, and to prayerfully seek God's guidance for the journey ahead.

The past year, like all seasons, was a mix of joys and challenges. Maybe you've celebrated weddings, or the birth of a child, or grandchild, or maybe mourned the loss of dear loved one?

Wanted: Monthly River Water Quality Testers!

Are you concerned about pollution in our local rivers and streams? Do you have 30 minutes to spare a month? If the answer is yes, then you could be a water watcher!

River charity Thames21 are looking for volunteer citizen scientists across the Vale of White Horse to monitor the health of local waterbodies every month. The data will be used to detect pollution hotspots and hold Thames Water, local councils and the Environment Agency to account. All training, equipment and ongoing support is provided free of charge.

There are two upcoming training events to hear in more detail about the project, meet other volunteers and learn how to take samples. Pre-booking is essential.

- Prune apple and pear trees.
 (https://www.rhs.org.uk/fruit/apples/pruning-made-easy)
- Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring.
- Check watering of houseplants keeping them just moist.
- Inspect stored tubers of dahlia, begonia and cannas for rot or drying out
- Start forcing rhubarb.
- Cut off hellebore leaves at base to discourage black spot and show off flowers.
- Keep putting out food and water for the birds.
