The Vicar Writes –

Dear Parishioner **Being Peace-makers in a World of Tension**

Wherever we turn these days—on the news, in our communities, or even within our own families—we encounter tension, conflict, and division. From global unrest to personal disagreements, the world feels heavy with anxiety – and without much vision. Little, if any sense of what the country/world could be like if **only** we could do A.B.C to help move us in that direction.

Only last week, I was in a Zoom meeting with national clergy colleagues, and the conversation was going along with fun, banter and good temper. Then, out of nowhere, someone made a simple remark and a woman – usually quiet, reserved and graceful – let rip! Out came a series of statements that left most of us speechless. After a pause, those most embarrassed tried to fill the silence with lots of words – struggling for the right thing to say. A few (sadly) chose to equally get over 'their side' with as much passion, whilst others of us looked at our screens, silently thinking: *'What's the back-story here? What's led her to have these views and clearly caused her so much pain?'*

Be it an outspoken politician, a passionate campaigner, someone on a picket line, or someone who is an enigma, quiet, calm most of the time - but known for the occasional outburst – there's almost always a back-story. I've learnt from bad experience that trying to respond to them without trying to take the time, and care to hear and understand their story (even if we don't agree with their solutions) can go a long way to bridging the gaps, to building a bridge towards peace-making.

In times like these, I'm reminded of Jesus's words: **"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God"** (Matthew 5:9).

Notice, Jesus doesn't say, "Blessed are those who love peace" or "Blessed are the peaceful," but *peacemakers*. That is, people who **create** peace, who step

into the friction and help **calm** the storm. It's not always easy. In fact, being a peacemaker often requires courage, humility, and great faith.

Peace-making begins with our own hearts. When we're overwhelmed or unsettled inside, it's much harder to offer peace to others. As St Paul writes to the church in Philippi, **"The peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."** (Phil 4:7)

This peace is not something we generate on our own—it is a gift from God. When we spend time in prayer, in reading the bible and in quiet reflection, we're reminded that we are loved, we are secure, and we are held by God - no matter what storms rage around us. Once we receive this peace, we are called to extend it to others.

Peace-making can take many forms: offering a listening ear to someone who's hurting, choosing grace over retaliation in an argument, or simply refusing to pass on gossip and negativity. It can be as simple—and as difficult—as saying, *"I was wrong, please forgive me,"* or *"Let's find a way to move forward together."*

But peace-making is not the same as avoiding conflict. Jesus Himself didn't shy away from difficult conversations or injustice. True peace is not the **absence** of conflict, but the **presence** of justice, mercy, and reconciliation. We're called not to sweep tensions under the rug, but to address them with love, truth, and a willingness to seek healing.

In our community and beyond, we can ask: **Where is there brokenness? Where is there misunderstanding? And what can I do to bring light and calm rather than adding fuel to the fire?**

Maybe it's reaching out to someone you've grown distant from. Maybe it's volunteering with an organisation that brings people together across divides. Maybe it's as simple as choosing kindness in a frustrating situation.

Let's also remember that peace-making is a *communal* effort. As a church, we're called to be a sign of God's kingdom—a place where love overcomes hate, where differences are held in grace, and where people find sanctuary from the storms of life. Our fellowship can be a powerful witness to a world desperate for hope.

Last month we celebrated the 80th anniversary of VE Day – a theme to which we shall return during the **Village Festival from 12-13 July**. This month, may I invite us all to reflect on where we are being called to be a peacemaker? Ask God to open our eyes to opportunities to bring calm where there is chaos, and healing where there is hurt. And when the task seems too great, remember that we follow the 'Prince of Peace', who has already overcome the world.

ST DENYS CHURCH – REORDERING – AN UPDATE!

For the past 15 years or so, plans have been explored to make St Denys more adaptable for a wide variety of events and activities, serving the whole parish.

With our village population expanding all the time, and housing developments popping up without any new community facilities included, the village is desperately in need of an extra communal

space which can be booked for all sorts of events, complimenting the extremely popular, but often already hired out, Village Hall.

Currently, St Denys has no formal kitchen and no toilet facilities – both of which severely reduces the potential use. Before I arrived as vicar in 2013, many in our village gave generously towards the Reordering project. Those funds have been held in an interest account, as a Restricted Fund. All donations made can **only** be used for the Reordering and not for any other church purpose. Such initial funds have enabled the Parochial Church Council (trustees) to consider, over time, with professional advice, the best way of developing the inside of the church in an appropriate manner for a Grade I Listed building. The funds have also paid for architect plans, heating consultant's reports and the purchase of new chairs, and round tables able to cater for eight places each.

Initial plans included a meeting room in the actual tower – which was later deemed unsuitable due to access and size. A variety of options then followed related to potential underfloor heating for when our existing boilers give up. But, heating technology is changing so fast that this style of heating is no longer deemed suitable in our case. Having come up with a revised plan, we were then hit by the Covid season and, with prices rising, we deemed it necessary to consider afresh our real 'needs' for the village against our many 'wants'.

I am delighted to say that following a huge amount of reflection, tweaking of plans and professional advice, we're now very close to securing agreement for the Reordering with the Oxford Diocese Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC). They recommend parish plans to the diocesan Chancellor, who grants a 'Faculty' (akin to a Planning Consent) on which we can proceed.

Because of rising building costs since our last estimates (just before Covid) and, the bad news that the Government has stopped the provision whereby churches can reclaim the VAT spent on building works (capping claims to only £25,000 a year!), we have just commissioned a Quantity Surveyor to price out each section of the recording. This includes, amongst other things, a disabled, and one other toilet on the ground floor of the tower, and a kitchenette against the south wall. Once this is to hand, and considering the VAT developments, the PCC will liaise with our architects, and the DAC, submit final plans for approval. Whilst we anticipate external 'consultees' such as English Heritage etc will come to review plans and make their representations to the diocese, we are advised a Faculty decision is possible this Autumn. We will then need to raise a balance of funds via trusts and public appeals, then go to Tender and then, formally, Commission the works to start!

So, for those of you who gave to the project many years ago, a big 'thank you' and here's an update. For those new to the village, we look forward to sharing with you the plans in more detail once a Faculty has been granted. This will be by way of public meetings, and plans etc on our church website, and displayed inside church.

Calling All Nature Lovers!

Many of us enjoy seeing the swifts flying high overhead, with their screaming calls reminding us of warm summer months. They are amazing birds – they migrate 3,400 miles twice a year and have a top speed of 69 mph. They pair for life and return to the same spot each year to nest. They eat, drink, mate and sleep on the wing, only landing to breed.

Swifts are now classed as endangered for risk of extinction in Great Britain due to a rapid fall in population. So we'd like to make sure their existing nest sites in the village are protected and new ones added to enhance breeding opportunities.

What makes a good site for a swift box?

- On the wall of a building at least 5 metres (16 feet) above the ground, tightly under the eaves.
- Must have clear access so it's easy for the swifts to fly into the box from beneath.
- Facing north, east or somewhere in between.

Swifts often nest in gaps under the eaves of buildings, so if you're having any repairs or building work done, please do this with consideration for swifts. This is extra important if you already have an existing nesting site. Can work be done outside the breeding season, taking care to preserve the bird's access to their nests?

There is a leaflet on the village Facebook groups about this or we can send it to you by email. As well as swift bird boxes, swifts can use specially placed holes made in soffits, or 'swift bricks'.

Can you help in any of the following ways?:

- Do you know of a swift nest in Stanford? Please tell us where it is.
- Have you seen 'screaming parties' – groups of two or more birds flying and calling loudly around or just above rooftop height. Please tell us where.
- You can log swift nests, boxes and screaming parties on swiftmapper.org.uk – or we can verify and add logs.
- Do you have a building with a swift nest? We can make sure you have the information you need to take good care of your swift family.
- Do you have a suitable location for a nest box? Or do you already have a swift box that hasn't been used yet?
- Would you like to make some swift boxes for people in the village?
- Are you good with ladders and able to fit some boxes?
- Are you the person who's already monitoring swifts in Stanford? If so thank you and we'd love to coordinate with you!
- Swifts eat insects, so you can also help by making your garden more wildlife friendly.

Some teams are made of up of ringers with many years' experiences, while some, such as ours, include a number of ringers who are still at a relatively early stage in their ringing experience. Developing into a good bell ringer requires good listening skills and many hours of practice across months and years.

Last year, as a very new band, our attempt was rewarded with the "Most Improved" trophy, reflecting the achievement of the band which included 4 (out of 6) novice ringers. This year the same band successfully moved up in terms of ranking position but were again awarded the "Most Improved" trophy, this time reflecting the development of the band in now achieving a higher competence including more complex ringing.

This award (and the accompanying box of chocolates) was a welcome recognition, by our peers, of the progress that our new ringers have made in 12 months. Equally rewarding are the comments we receive from villagers who hear us ringing every week and who have commented that they can hear the obvious improvements in skill. Thank you for noticing.

This last year improvements have included:

- New stage curtains thanks to PPC funding.
- Shelving in the cupboard in the small hall to aid hirers storage.
- The installation of the solar panels. Many thanks to the PPC for the grant to cover most of the costs.
- Changing all the lights in both halls to LED bulbs.

Both halls have their own kitchen facilities and toilets, including disabled. The surrounding area has been planted and includes a safe fenced children's outside play garden. There is a large car park with ample car parking space for about 40 cars. 

GARDENING TIPS FOR JUNE

- Make direct sowings of runner beans, dwarf beans, salad crops etc.
 - Harvest lettuce, radish and early potatoes.
 - Plant up summer hanging baskets and containers.
 - Pinch out side-shoots on tomatoes.
 - Hoe borders regularly to keep down weeds.
 - Mow lawns as needed but consider leaving some areas uncut for wildlife.
 - Plant out summer bedding.
 - Prune many spring flowering shrubs.
- Shade greenhouses to keep cool & prevent scorch.

For over 30 years, St Denys has organised a two-day summer Festival to help bring the whole village together and, to raise funds for village organisations. On the Saturday, the church provides outside events/entertainments etc., with all proceeds raised, once the costs of the festival have been deducted, going towards the year-on-year costs of maintaining St Denys church for use by the whole village – whether they worship there, or not. On the Sunday, we invite village organisations to book a stand to promote their activities/events, as well as raising funds for their group.

In recent years we as a church, as well as village groups, have increasingly found it difficult to secure enough volunteers to offer all the stands/activities we'd like. As a result, this has reduced the number of stalls, events, activities available for the enjoyment of all and, of course, reduces the fundraising potential at a time when all village groups need funds to keep going/develop their core activities.

This Festival there are many ways you can help us lay on a fantastic weekend for all. Just one hour's worth of help by lots of people is all that is needed. You might be able to help with:

- **Setting up at 9am and packing away around 5pm each day**
- **Serving drinks for an hour in the village hall**
- **Making crepes or, e.g. Candyfloss on a stall**
- **Providing one hour's cover on a stand, before being replaced by another volunteer**
- **Putting up posters around the village**

Invitations have gone out to village organisations asking if they'd like to take part this year. In 2024, many said they'd love to, but couldn't find any volunteers for the 4.5 hours on the Sunday. It would be great if we could find an army of volunteers for the Saturday and link volunteers up with village groups struggling to take their place this year.

If we don't secure more volunteers, the church may well have to consider reducing the Stanford Festival to just a one-day event which would be a real shame. With our faithful festival volunteers now retired, or getting older and needing to reduce their load, we really do need a **new generation of helpers** to take on the baton. Artwork to celebrate 150 Years of Stanford School

We worked closely with a local blacksmith artist called Hazel Moore to create a piece that incorporates the flower names of the classrooms and some minibeasts to represent us being an Eco School and loving the outdoor environment.
